## **Australian football (AFL)**

Guideline review date: 28 October 2021

This guideline is provided to support schools in implementing the <u>managing risks in school curriculum</u> <u>activities procedure</u>.

The <u>CARA planner</u> must be used for the specific school context in conjunction with this guideline considering additional risks, hazards and controls and including environmental, facility, equipment and student considerations.

For activities beyond the scope of this guideline, complete a CARA record using the CARA generic template.

## **Activity scope**

This guideline relates to participation in Australian football (AFL) as an activity to support curriculum delivery.

For activities conducted at a non-Department of Education venue, and/or when engaging external expertise, request written risk assessment advice and attach it to this CARA record.

For activities conducted off-site, schools must comply with the <u>school excursions and international school study tours procedure</u>.

For activities conducted as part of representative school sport programs, schools should consult with Queensland School Sport.

#### Medium risk

AFL activities involving minimal risk of oppositional contact and/or mouth injury (e.g. Auskick, AFL 9's).

#### High risk

AFL activities involving risk of oppositional contact and/or mouth injury.

## **Activity requirements**

If any requirement cannot be met, the activity must not occur.

If any other safety recommendation cannot be met, modify the activity (or elements of it) and/or identify and use the <u>hierarchy of controls</u> to implement alternative control measures to meet or exceed the minimum safety standard.

Competition rules and procedures with additional or more stringent safety requirements must take precedence.

#### Students

Schools must consider age, maturity and skill level of students when planning curriculum activities. Adjustments are required for <u>students with disability</u> to support access and participation in the curriculum. Consult with the parents/carers of students with disability, or when appropriate the student, to ensure risks related to their child's participation in the activity are identified and managed.

Schools must consult current student medical information and/or health plans in accordance with the <u>managing students' health support needs at school procedure</u>. Record information about any student condition (e.g. physical or medical) that may inhibit safe engagement in the activity and include specific support measures within emergency procedures.

#### **Emergency and first-aid**

Emergency plans and injury management procedures must be established for foreseeable incidents (e.g. evacuation procedure, provision of <u>first aid</u>).

Adult supervisors must have:

- emergency contact details of all participants
- a medical alert list and a process for administering student medication
- communication equipment suitable to conditions (e.g. mobile phone) and a process for obtaining external assistance and/or receiving emergency advice.

Safety procedures must be determined for the location (e.g. out-of-bounds areas, location of first aid support and equipment).

Access is required to <u>first aid equipment (DOCX, 479KB)</u> and consumables suitable for foreseeable incidents.

An adult with current emergency qualifications is required to be quickly accessible to the activity area. Emergency qualifications include:

- HLTAID009—provide cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) or equivalent
- <u>HLTAID011—provide first aid</u> or <u>SISSS00118—sports trainer level 1</u> or equivalent.

Additionally, for high risk activities:

• An adult with concussion management knowledge or training is required (consult the <u>AFL community</u> concussion guidelines).

#### Induction and instruction

Induction is required for all adult supervisors on emergency procedures and safety procedures. If the activity is conducted at an off-site facility, induction is to be informed by advice provided in consultation with expertise at the venue.

Instruction is required for students and adult supervisors on correct techniques (e.g. safe play, first aid support).

#### Consent

<u>Parent consent</u> is required for all activities conducted off-site and strongly recommended for **high risk** activities conducted on-site.

For high risk activities:

Mouthguards and a medical declaration are required. The medical declaration must include the
following statement, 'I understand that mouth protection is mandatory in this sport. I have read the
information provided to me about mouth protection and accept responsibility for the type of mouth
protection I/my child will wear whilst playing this sport.'

## Supervision

Principals make final supervision decisions for the activity. Sufficient adult supervision must be provided to manage the activity safely (including emergency situations).

The number of adult supervisors required to fulfil emergency and supervision roles must consider the nature of the activity, students' ages, abilities and specialised learning, access and/or health needs.

Before the activity, all adult supervisors:

- must be familiar with the contents of the CARA record
- must assess <u>weather conditions</u> prior to undertaking the activity, inspecting the intended location in order to identify variable risks, hazards and potential dangers.

During the activity, all adult supervisors:

- must be readily identifiable
- must closely monitor students with health support needs
- must comply with control measures from the CARA record and adapt as hazards arise
- must suspend the activity if the conditions become unfavourable (e.g. extreme temperatures, thunderstorms).

## **Supervisor qualifications**

Principals make final decisions in determining supervisor capability (competence, relevance and currency) and are responsible for encouraging and enabling school-based activity supervisors to raise their qualifications to improve safety standards.

All adult supervisors must comply with the <u>working with children authority—Blue Cards procedure</u> and be able to identify, and respond to, risks or hazards that may emerge during the activity.

A registered teacher must be appointed to maintain overall responsibility for the activity.

#### For medium risk activities:

• At least one adult supervisor is required to be a registered teacher, or other adult supervisor working under the direct supervision of a registered teacher, with competence (knowledge and skills) in teaching AFL.

#### For high risk activities:

- At least one adult supervisor is required to be a registered teacher, or other adult supervisor working under the direct supervision of a registered teacher, with <u>foundation coach accreditation</u> from the AFL for the current season (or equivalent demonstrated capability).
- Qualified coaches and officials must be in control of competition games.
- Field umpires must have <u>national umpire accreditation</u> for the current season. Note: Any accredited umpire who is currently a student of a participating school must not be appointed as field umpire to an unmodified game.
- If boundary and/or goal umpires are not provided by the Umpires Association, each school should provide competent officials (such as parents with knowledge and skills) to fulfil these roles.

## Facilities and equipment

The qualified adult supervisor of the activity, in consultation with the principal, determines the requirements for facilities and equipment appropriate to the local context.

Location must be suitable for the activity being undertaken, including sufficient space to ensure safe participation and that safety rules and procedures can be followed.

Participants must wear <u>personal protective equipment</u> appropriate to the activity (e.g. enclosed footwear).

Fit-for-purpose goalpost padding made from impact absorbing foam is required (minimum 35mm thick, 2.5m high).

### Hazards and controls

Further to those listed, include any additional hazards and control measures considering the local context of the activity.

Environmental hazards	Control measures
<b>Biological hazards</b> Body fluids (e.g. blood, saliva, sweat)	Manage bodily substances (e.g. blood) and open wounds before, during and after the activity.  Consult infection control guidelines (PDF, 946KB) and Queensland Health's exclusion periods for infectious conditions poster (PDF, 1.5MB) for hygienic practices and first aid.
	Follow appropriate cleaning and hygiene management practices when using shared equipment (Departmental staff search "cleaning advice for shared equipment" in OnePortal).
Environmental conditions	The school's <u>sun safety strategy</u> must be followed.
Weather, sun, humidity	Assess weather ( <u>Bureau of Meteorology</u> ) and environmental conditions prior to participating outside.
	Follow the managing excessive heat in schools guidelines when participating in very hot or extreme heat conditions.
	Ensure drink breaks occur regularly. Make water available for individual participants between drink breaks.
Facilities and equipment hazards	Control measures
Boundary clearance	Establish a 5m safety zone around the playing area. If this cannot be achieved, consider ways of reducing risks (e.g. reducing the field size, padding the obstacle).
	Ensure there are no sharp or rough edges (e.g. portable signage) facing the field of play.
Chemicals	Lines are marked on grass in accordance with the line marking of sports fields fact sheet (PDF, 394KB).
Faulty or dangerous equipment	Use markers made from non-injurious material (e.g. cardboard, foam).
	Check equipment for damage before and during the activity.
	Check footwear before each match to ensure they provide sufficient protection for the feet. Look for non-slip soles, no buckles or zips, no metal studs, no loose,

	sharp-edged or excessively worn studs and no sharp-edged soles.
Playing surface	Conduct a field check to identify and manage surface hazards. Clear the playing surface from loose items or debris. Do not participate on a surface that is slippery, unduly rough or chopped up.
	Cover/fill playing surface hazards (e.g. sprinkler heads, holes) to be level with the surrounds.

Student considerations	Control measures
<b>Physical contact</b> Breaks/sprains,	Use headgear (recommended for activities involving collision).
cuts/abrasions/grazes, concussion, accidental 'bumping'	Enforce rules to prevent rough play. Consult <u>Play by the Rules</u> (Conduct and Behaviour resources) and the <u>AFL Junior Match Policy</u> .
	Do not allow students to return to play after injury until the injury has been managed according to established procedures. If in doubt, the student should not play until medically cleared.
Physical exertion Exhaustion and fatigue	Conduct warm-up/cool-down activities.
	Continually monitor participants for signs of fatigue and exhaustion.
Student issues Student numbers, special needs, high risk behaviours, medical conditions, separation from the group	Select students for on-field position(s) on the basis of ability, size and suitability.
	Remove accessories (e.g. jewellery, lanyards) before participating.
	Ensure fingernails, hair and clothing (e.g. pockets) do not interfere with the activity.
